Epilogue: My Conversion Experience

The following sentence, written by me for use by the Commandant to explain why the Marine Corps alone among the services integrated communications and intelligence, represents my frustration with the kum-ba-ya crowd that is all communications and no intelligence: "Communications without intelligence is noise;

- intelligence without communications is irrelevant." Absent a unifying public intelligence network, all the advocacy groups will remain "noise."
